DETAILED ITINERARY

DAY 1 DEPART THE USA/FLY TO QUITO, ECUADOR

Tuesday, June 25

Independent Air arrivals this evening in Quito. Surrounded by snow-capped volcanoes but only 24 km from the Equator, Quito enjoys a spring-like climate all year round. Although an important city in Inca and pre-Inca times, its original buildings have been erased and what remains today is divided between the historic Spanish colonial architecture and the clean lines of the modern era. This contrast of superb, well-preserved colonial churches and convents versus shining glass and sleek contemporary architecture makes Quito one of the most beautiful cities in Latin America. Meet your Conservancy Travel Trip Leader who will oversee your entire journey. Altitude: 9,350 feet. GO Quito Hotel

DAY 2 FLY QUITO / SAN CRISTOBAL ISLAND & EMBARK CORAL I Wednesday, June 26

Early morning breakfast, transfer from the hotel to the airport at 6:30 a.m. and fly to the Galapagos Islands. The flight departs Quito at 9:30 a.m. The plane makes a brief stop in Guayaquil before continuing to the Galapagos Islands airport on San Cristobal Island, arriving 12:06 p.m. Meet your naturalist guides and embark your private catamaran, the *Coral I*.

After lunch on board, we'll go ashore in Puerto Baquerizo Moreno, the capital of the Galapagos Islands. At the **Interpretation Center**, we'll have an overview of the volcanic formation of Galapagos, its remote location, ocean currents and climate, and the arrival of the species and their colonization.

Then we'll take an energetic hike up **Frigatebird Hill** (Cerro Tijeretas) where we see the nesting colony of both species of frigatebird found in the Galapagos: The Magnificent and the Great Frigatebird, and have a beautiful view over the bay below. *Coral I, BLD*

Activity: Dry landing. Flat walk of 1 hour, with some stairs at the Interpretation Center; Moderate 1-hour hike on rocky terrain to Frigatebird Hill.

DAY 3 SAN CRISTOBAL ISLAND

Thursday, June 27

This morning we'll use our pangas (small motorized boats) to take a scenic cruise around Leon Dormido - **Kicker Rock**. This ancient and eroded volcanic tuff lava, approximately 148 meters high, resembles a sleeping lion. Wading ashore, the stunning cliffs of Sorcerers Hill tower above. We enjoy simply sharing the beach with sea lions, snorkeling from shore or taking a walk to a hidden lagoon where we may spot Black-necked Silts, Ruddy Turnstones, Whimbrels and White-cheeked Pintails.

Activity: Boat Cruise. Wet landing. Climbing in and out of dinghy boat, easy 1-hour walk on sandy terrain, option to snorkel for an hour.

This afternoon, we explore **Pitt Islet and Pitt Point**, where sea lions greet us as we land on the beach and prepare for our climb to a high point on the steep eroded tuff cone. This is the only place in the islands where we have the chance to see all three of the booby species in the same place. The Red-Foots will be perched on the Cordia lutea and small trees, the Nazcaís on the ground near the cliff edge, while the Blue-Foots will be a little further inland. Frigatebirds



and other sea birds are all around and the views from the top of the lava are breathtaking. Coral I, BLD

Activity: Wet Landing. Moderately strenuous 2.5 hour uphill/downhill hike on rocky terrain; options to snorkel or kayak for 40 minutes.

DAY 4 ESPAÑOLA ISLAND

Friday, June 28

Today we're on Española, the geologically oldest island of the archipelago One of the highlights of the trip, **Suarez Point** is a



nature paradise due to the high percentage of endemic species due to its isolation from the rest of the islands. A slew of marine iguanas and sea lions greet us at the landing site. From here, our hike along a trail brings close encounters with boobies, lava lizards, colorful Sally Light-foot crabs. The famous Soplador a blowhole that spurts seawater up to 75 feet in the air is a dramatic backdrop to the abundant wildlife. *Coral I, BLD*

Activity: Dry Landing. Strenuous 2.5 hour hike on rocky terrain.

We continue our exploration of Espanola after lunch, at Gardner Bay, one of the most stunning beaches in all of Galapagos. The long, white, sandy coral beach, lapped by turquoise waters is home to a colony of Galapagos sea lions, indifferent to the humans that walk amongst them. The Hood Mockingbirds, endemic to this island, are plentiful and Darwin Finches may also join the throng that includes the reclusive Warbler Finch. This is the breeding site of nearly all of the world's 12,000 pairs of Waved Albatross, in the height of their breeding season between April and December. With luck, we may catch their complex courtship display. We can snorkel from the beach, in the shallow waters of the bay, amidst the King Angelfish, Damsel Fish, Parrotfish, manta rays and white-tipped reef sharks. *Coral I, BLD*

Activity: Easy 1-hour walk on sandy terrain, option to snorkel.

DAY 5 FLOREANA ISLAND

Saturday, June 29

We have a wet landing onto **Green Beach**, its intriguing color comes from a high percentage of olivine crystals in the sand. We hike from black mangrove beds to a brackish lagoon, home to one





of the largest flamingo populations in the Galapagos, where other birds such as Common Stilts and White-Cheeked Pintails can also be seen. This island features endemic plants such as Scalesia villosa, white and black mangrove and Palo Santo. The trail continues to **Four Sand Beach**, a beautiful white coral sand beach, one of the most important nesting sites of Green Pacific Sea Turtles. Here, we'll keep to the beach, as Sting Rays may be lurking in the shallow water under the sand, and we don't want to step on one! From the beach, we can spot sea turtles, Blue-Footed Boobies plunging into the water and small reef sharks floating along the shoreline in the search for food. Returning to our starting point at the green sand beach, it's safe to swim or snorkel amongst sea turtles, reef fish, sea lions and maybe even white-tipped reef sharks. A small colony of penguins resides on Floreana and may sometimes be observed as well.

Activity: Wet Landing. Easy 1-hour walk on flat, sandy beach; Option to swim or snorkel for 1 hour.

After lunch, we're on the north side of Floreana in **Post Office Bay**, named for a wooden barrel that was placed there in 1793, that served as an informal post office for sailors passing through, who would take the letters on to their destinations. Today, visitors continue the tradition by placing unstamped postcards inside the barrel, hoping that some other traveler, going to the letter's destination, will take it back for free. Here we may also encounter Darwin's Finches, Yellow Warbler and Lava Lizards, and have an opportunity to snorkel with Green Pacific Sea Turtles and among playful sea lions. *Coral I, BLD*

Activity: Wet Landing. Easy 30-minute walk on a sandy beach; Option to swim or snorkel for 1 hour.

DAY 6 SANTA CRUZ ISLAND

Sunday, June 30

This morning we explore the highlands of Santa Cruz by bus, to discover giant tortoises in their natural habitat. Santa Cruz has a population of about 8,000 giant tortoises. The drive shows the contrasting ecosystems of the island, as road extends from the



coast through the agricultural zone and straight up to the dense, humid forests. Often, Galapagos Giant Tortoises are spotted, wandering through pastures. The deep green of the Scalesia trees is a lush contrast to the dry lowland. **The Highlands Tortoise Reserve** is a bird lover's paradise, as almost every land bird present on the island lives or migrates here; Tree and Ground finches, Vermillion Flycatchers, Paint-billed Crakes, Yellow Warblers, and Cattle Egrets, usually seen standing on the tortoises' back!

Activity: Dry Landing. 45-minute drive. Easy 1.5 mile/1.5 hour walk on flat, dirt or muddy terrain.

This afternoon, we're in **Puerto Ayora** and we visit the famous **Charles Darwin Research Station**. Here we'll learn about conservation programs carried out by the National Park, with the scientific support of the Charles Darwin Station. We visit the Tortoise captive breeding program and learn about famous "Lonesome George" who died in 2012, the last Pinta tortoise. Take some time to visit the town, where you'll have one of the only opportunities to shop locally. *Coral I, BLD*

Activity: Dry Landing. 1.5-hour walking on flat terrain. Shopping.







DAY 7 GENOVESA ISLAND

Monday, July 1

We'll land on a beach where a small colony of fur seals lounge in the sun. We'll see the variety of sea life that shelters in the crevices of the lava cliffs of **El Barranco - Prince Phillip's Steps** – steep, rock steps that pass through a seabird colony of Nazca and Red-footed Boobies up to a high cliff-face and plateau. At the top, we'll take the trail inland where nesting booby colonies are found in the Palo Santo forest. We may also find Short-eared Lava Owls, Galapagos Swallows, and Galapagos Doves.

Activity: Dry Landing. After a steep climb up a rock stairway, Moderately easy walk 45 minutes/1 mile on rocky lava terrain.

After lunch on board, we disembark on the small sand and coral beach of **Darwin Bay**. A short trail heads west along through mangroves filled with Nazca Boobies and Swallow-tailed Gulls. It's estimated that more than 200,000 Red-footed Boobies live in the trees and bushes of Genovesa; one of the few places in the islands where we are guaranteed to see them.

Further down the path are tidal pools where sea lions swim playfully and we may find Lava Gulls, Yellow-crowned and Lava Herons. Arriving at the end of the trail, we'll have a spectacular

view over the cliffs and Darwin Bay. Snorkeling from the beach, we find rays, colorful reef fish and hammerhead sharks. *Coral I, BLD*

Activity: Wet Landing. Moderate Hike 2.5 hours/1 mile over sand and lava. Options for snorkeling, kayaking & dinghy ride.

DAY 8 RABIDA & BARTOLOME ISLANDS Tuesday, July 2

This morning, we're exploring **Rabida**, the volcanic lava red island, very rich in iron oxide and magnesium (typical of Galapagos basaltic lava); that when exposed, rusts, giving the island its astounding, unearthly reddish color. The island is a birdwatcher's delight, being the only Galapagos site where the nine Dawin's Finches are found, and Large-billed Flycatchers, Galapagos Hawks and Brown Pelicans. The unique landscape is punctuated by Palo Santo forests, endemic cacti, small craters and cliffs. The red beach is inhabited by hundreds of sea lions together with a nesting colony of pelicans. In the background, Flamingos inhabit a small salty lagoon. We can walk along the trail or navigate by dinghy along the shoreline to spot fur seals, pelicans, blue-footed boobies and Nazca boobies.

Activity: Wet Landing. Trail: 1.5 hour/.5 mile walk. Option to snorkel or take a dinghy ride.



Back on board, we navigate to **Bartolome Island**, at the center of the archipelago, is an extinct volcano with a variety of red, orange, black and even green volcanic formations. Here, we have a choice of two landings. Choose to take a trail and 388 wooden steps up to the island's summit of 374 feet, for one of the best views of the islands and the most iconic and photogenic site in the Galapagos: Pinnacle Rock.

Or, the beach is perfect for snorkeling and possible sightings of the Galapagos penguin reef sharks, rays, and colorful fish. Coral I, BLD

Activity: Landing 1: Dry Landing. Strenuous 1.5 hour volcanic ash trail hike with 388 steps up/down. **Landing 2:** Wet Landing: 1 hour of snorkeling, swimming or walking on beach.

DAY 9 SANTA CRUZ & DEPARTURE

Wednesday, July 3

This morning we navigate along the north shore of Santa Cruz Island, accessible only by sea. A dinghy ride explores the turtle sanctuary **Black Turtle Cove**, where four species of mangrove in the interior lagoon harbor turtles, fish, White-tipped Reef Sharks and rays in the calm waters and sea birds such as pelicans, herons and egrets perch in the mangroves.

Activity: 1-hour dinghy ride.

Following the visit, we disembark and transfer to Baltra Airport for the flight back to the mainland, departing at 1:05 pm; arriving Guayaquil at 3:53 p.m. continuing to Quito, arriving at 5:43 p.m. Connect to your independently arranged international flights, departing after 9 p.m. *B*



DAY1 ARRIVALS IN QUITO, ECUADOR

Friday, June 21

Independent Arrivals to Quito UIO Airport.

Upon arrival in Ecuador's capital of Quito, that sits at 9,350 feet above sea level at the foot of the Pichincha Volcano. You will be met at the airport and transferred to your hotel for check in and overnight. The Conservancy Travel Trip Leader will be available to assist you this evening at the hotel.

Accommodation: GO Quito Hotel

DAY 2 OTAVALO / INDIGENOUS CULTURE & COMMUNITY Saturday, June 22

Buffet Breakfast in the hotel.

We'll check out of the hotel with an overnight bag (main luggage can be stored at the hotel) and depart with our Trip Leader and an expert local guide by motorcoach along the scenic Chaski Route through the Andes.

Walk through the famed craft market of Otavalo, which is the most famous and picturesque in South America. For visitors, the market offers the possibility of approaching Ecuadorians at a more intimate level as you negotiate prices of a variety of woven goods, bags, hats, flutes or simply appreciate the skillful and generous people responsible for the elegance and beauty of the clothing and handicrafts.

Drive by beautiful Lake Cuicocha, whose name comes from the Kichwa indigenous language and means "Lago del Cuy" or Guinea Pig Lake in English. It was given this name due to the guinea pig shape of the largest island in the middle of the lake. These animals play a significant part in the everyday life of indigenous people







as they make for a high protein meal especially for populations living in high altitude.

Visit the village of Peguche, known for traditional weaving and the handcrafted Andean musical wind instruments. The tour also offers a range of alternatives, including villages such as Cotacachi, an Indian village which features leatherwork including bags, jackets, hats, gloves, and belts.

The drive continues through marvelous Andean landscapes, as we head into the indigenous community of the Karanki Magdalena. Home of Atahualpa, the last of the Inca Emperors, Karanki Magdalena is at approximately 9,842 feet above sea level with a privileged location surrounded by valleys and lagoons.

Upon arrival, community members will demonstrate local planting techniques, including the materials and animals used to farm a variety of products including potatoes, quinoa, lupin, corn, beans, and other vegetables. Then enjoy a gastronomy lesson while the host family prepares a traditional lunch.

This afternoon, choose a 2-hour mountain bike journey across beautiful Andean landscapes or horseback riding through a variety of moorland vegetation.

Check into the hotel. Dinner included in the hotel.

DAY 3 CONDOR PARK / QUITO

Sunday, June 23

After breakfast in the hotel, we'll return to the Karanki Magdalena community to explore the Karanki Atahualpa Sun Temple. Then, visit the Parque Condor which is a sanctuary for a variety of birds of prey including Ecuador's national bird, the Andean Condor. Learn about the local birdlife, conservation efforts and the threats they face.

After lunch at our Hacienda, we'll drive back to Quito and return to the hotel for check in and overnight.

DAY 4 COLONIAL QUITO & MIDDLE OF THE WORLD Monday, June 24

We begin our full day exploration of Quito with a scenic ride on the Quito cable car, then continue by private motorcoach to "Mitad del Mundo" - Middle of the World Complex - and the Equator Monument situated at 0°0'0" latitude. Next, we examine pre-colonial history and traditions of Ecuador's indigenous peoples at the Ethnographic Mindalae Craftsman Museum, which features pottery, weaving, and pre-Columbian religious and mythological iconography, created as a tribute by local craftsman to their ancestors. We'll have a lunch of typical dishes in a local restaurant.

With our expert local guide, walk through the enchanting streets of Colonial Quito to explore a vibrant tapestry of churches, structures and historical sites, each representing an aspect of the city's colonial history. Stop in the Plaza San Francisco, an em-

blematic urban scene since colonial times, step inside to behold the grandeur of the Church and convent of San Francisco, a majestic architectural complex, the oldest and most significant religious site in Ecuador. At La Plaza De La Independencia, we find the city's most important buildings: the Government Palace, the Arzobispal Palace, the municipality offices, and the Independence monument that embodies the spirit of Ecuador's historic struggle for freedom from Colonial rule. Return to the hotel for dinner and evening at leisure.

DAY 5 ORCHIDS, BIRDS AND BUTTERFLIES IN THE CLOUD FOREST

Tuesday, June 25

Early breakfast and departure by motorcoach on our full day excursion with our local guide. Today we explore the biodiversity of the cloud forest, located only 52 miles northwest of Quito. We drive through the changing landscapes, observing the variety of vegetation and animal species. Our first stop is in beautiful, pristine Alambi Reserve. Here, we'll take a nature walk to observe the many species of birds, orchids and bromeliads. We continue our journey along the Andes Chocó corridor, an area known for its biodiversity, to the small town of Mindo. Here, we'll visit a butterfly farm to learn more about their life cycle and their role in the ecosystem. After lunch in the town, we'll have some free time to explore independently.

Return to Quito in the late afternoon. Main group arrivals this afternoon and evening.

Dinner at leisure.
