

Discover ancient Maya civilization — their remarkable sophistication and wide-ranging achievements. Rejuvenate in pristine landscapes: lush jungles, vibrant coral reefs, crystal-clear waters and picturesque beaches. Snorkel UNESCO World Heritage Belize Barrier Reef, the second-largest coral reef system in the world, to explore colorful coral gardens, swim with sharks and rays, and encounter diverse marine species. Savor a melting pot of cultures, reflected in the country's food, music, art and traditions.

DETAILED ITINERARY

DAY 1 - THURSDAY, MARCH 7, 2025

DEPART USA TO BELIZE - CROOKED TREE LAGOON

Independent flights to Belize. Please choose flights that arrive by 1:00 p.m. Depart the airport and drive approximately one hour, to Crooked Tree Lagoon, renowned for its more than 300 species of birds, wildlife such as crocodiles, iguanas and turtles. Discover the diverse flora and fauna right on the property and take a guided nature walk along the shore. *Bird's Eye View Lodge (B,L,D)*

DAY 2 - FRIDAY, MARCH 8 LAMANAI

Rise early to take in the spectacular scenery, bird- and wildlife on an early morning boat tour on the lagoon, before breakfast. After breakfast, drive to Orange Walk Town and the New River landing to embark on a boat for a cruise down the New River, a principal transportation route in Mayan times, past the Mennonite farms to Lamanai. Explore Lamanai, one of Belize's largest Maya sites, situated on the bank of the 30-mile-long New River Lagoon. It features monumental architecture of temples and palaces dating from the Classic and Pre-Classic Periods. A major attraction of Lamanai is the well-preserved mask of a Maya ruler emerging from a crocodile headdress. Set in tropical forest and providing amazing views from several of its large temples, Lamanai provides both a unique glimpse into the culture of the Maya and of the biological diversity of the tropical rainforest. Climb to the top for a spectacular view. We are likely to see Toucans and other birds in the high canopy. Return to our lodge and enjoy the natural beauty and sunset. Bird's Eye View Lodge (B,L,D)







DAY 3 - SATURDAY, MARCH 9 CAYO DISTRICT

Optional early morning nature walk to enjoy the abundant bird life. After breakfast, we drive from the wetlands, marshes and savannahs of Northern Belize into the lush, dense rainforests and rugged mountains of the Western Cayo District, a drive of approximately three hours. San Ignacio Resort Hotel or similar (B,L,D)

DAY 4 - SUNDAY, MARCH 10 CARACOL

Depart for a full day of exploration through the Mountain Pine Ridge to the spectacular Mayan ruins of Caracol, located deep in the rainforest beyond the mountains. This was a huge Mayan city and a major rival of Tikal. The Caana Sky Palace in Caracol is still the largest manmade structure in Belize. Here, we examine the Maya carvings that illustrate Caracol's rivalry in battle and sport with Tikal. Then discover the stunning geological formations of Rio Frio Cave and refresh in the cool waters of the Rio On Pools in the Mountain Pineridge.

DAY 5 - MONDAY, MARCH 11 TIKAL, GUATEMALA

Spend a day over the border in Guatemala, to visit UNESCO World Heritage Tikal to learn insights into the Maya civilization, their sophisticated and complex accomplishments. Tikal was one of the most powerful and influential Mayan cities during the Classic Period (c 200-900AD). The site features several hundred ancient structures that include towering pyramids, ceremonial platforms, residential complexes and ball courts. San Ignacio Resort Hotel or similar (B,L)

DAY 6 - TUESDAY, MARCH 12 XUNANTUNICH

Explore the remarkable Mayan ruins at Xunantunich, situated atop a ridge overlooking the Mopan River and the surrounding jungle. The site's name translates to "Stone Woman" or "Maiden of the Rock" in the Mayan language, derived from a local legend of a ghostly female figure that is said to haunt the site. The massive pyramid temple known as "El Castillo" is one of the tallest Mayan period structures in Belize, towering 130 feet above the site.

Then, enjoy a relaxing canoe trip down the Macal River while surrounded by the lush jungle, as our guides point out the colorful birds, butterflies and wildlife along its banks.

DAY 7 - WEDNESDAY, MARCH 13 HOPKINS

We depart the Cayo District this morning, and drive approximately four hours to Hopkins. The scenic journey first winds through the mountainous terrain of the lush inland jungle then descends to the plains and wetlands of the coastal region. Pass through colorful small towns and villages, glimpsing local life. Arrive in the village of Hopkins, known for its laid-back vibe, Garifuna culture and spectacular beaches. After lunch, choose to relax at the resort, take a self-guided hike, or an optional guided river tubing tour in the Cockscomb Jaguar Preserve: Hike a short (20 minutes) distance into the jungle, then float on inner tubes down the serene South Stann Creek River, amongst the birdlife and verdant foliage. (Additional cost, reserved on-site.) Almond Beach Resort (B,L,D)



DAY 8 - THURSDAY, MARCH 14

BELIZE BARRIER REEF RESERVE / GARIFUNA CULTURE

This morning, we head out onto the reef for snorkeling by boat. The Belize Barrier Reef Reserve System, a UNESCO World Heritage Site, is the second-largest barrier reef in the world and is renowned for its incredible diversity of coral species, including vibrant hard corals, soft corals, and sea fans. The reef's healthy coral formations are home to a vast array of marine life, including colorful tropical fish, sea turtles, rays, eels, and countless other species.

Return to the hotel for lunch. This afternoon, learn about the Garifuna people through an immersive experience. We kayak a short distance across the pristine waters of a lagoon, to the Palmento Grove Cultural and Fishing Lodge, a small island facility created to capture the essence of a Garifuna village. Here, we'll learn how the Garifuna fish, produce and use coconut, grow and use medicinal herbs and how food is prepared over an open hearth. Enjoy music and drumming, and indigenous art. Almond Beach Resort (B,L)

DAY 9 - FRIDAY, MARCH 15 SOUTH WATER CAYE

This morning, take a boat out to the reef for snorkeling, then enjoy lunch on the small, picturesque island of South Water Caye. Return to the resort by boat in the afternoon.

DAY 10 - SATURDAY, MARCH 16

DEPARTURE OR BEGIN AMBERGRIS CAYE EXTENSION
Early morning departure from the hotel to Belize International
Airport for flights departing after 12:00 p.m. (B)

Or, begin extension to Ambergris Caye
